## MHI Resident Addresses HCC Homelessness Conference

It's Gina Monti's fifth year at Magnificat and her first as a Dean's List student at our neighbor Houston Community College Central,



where she gathers credits toward a business degree and a social services career. Gina was honored to speak as an HCC student who has experienced homelessness and as an MHI resident-volunteer. At the symposium, The Politics of Homelessness and HCC Students: Awareness, Solutions, Resources, she joined HCC students, professors, homeless advo-

cates, and film student Justice Butler, who showed her powerful documentary Invisible.

"Homeless students are forced to choose between tuition, transportation and lunch. This overlooked population may not be aware of the resources available-such food support and emergency shelter—and how we can help ourselves and others." Gina suggested students can help others by volunteering at MHI and St. Joseph Clubhouse.

### Monica (and Grace) Cross MHI's Bridge to Independence

#### "MHI provides a bridge back to the outside world and gives our residents the courage to cross it." Rose Mary Badami

Monica Lynn Smith drove away from her home of nearly five years with a healthy dose of joy and wistfulness. She looked forward to getting a job to support herself—she already had a good lead, and some strong skills she had developed at Magnificat while training in our thrift store and as a driver. Fellow resident Alan helped her fix up a clunker so she could drive into her new life in Killeen, with her best buddy Grace at her side. Residents, now friends, cheered her off-they would miss the joyful-hearted Monica and her perpetual smile...and Grace had their hearts too.

Monica had been through it all: life in the homeless encampment at Airline and Loop 610, struggling day to day surrounded by drugs, dealers, prostitution, petty crime and physical danger. Influences led her to jail time and a desperate bid to look life straight in the eye. When paroled, Monica

moved in with a friend who was subsequently evicted. She would not let herself return to the streets, where options were few and panhandling impossible for her. She abhorred the idea of "something for nothing." All she wanted was a

chance to turn her life around. She knew she had begun by her recent mental diagnosis and discovery of the right psych meds which eliminated her

desire for self-medication. Still, as the eviction date neared, Monica could find no place to take her while on psych meds. She was at her all-time low when she contacted Magnificat and was told psych meds were not a problem and would be monitored here. That night she had a new home at Sherman House surrounded by women who exactly understood her past and her plight. The next morning she would have been back on the streets.

She is unstinting in her gratitude toward Magnificat Houses: "I don't know what would have become of me if they had said no. Instead, I have taken a big step up in life. I will never forget all they've done for me."

Another grace note: Monica will now be living near her 9 month old grandson. How Grace-the-dog will handle her new affection is anybody's guess. But her name is a good hint.
