A Message from Executive Director John Boyles

As the country begins to see the two-year Covid Crisis in the rear view mirror, hope is breaking out all over. At Magnificat Houses, it's



manifested in every area of our mission. And though the pandemic was an ill wind, it brought MHI opportunity for forward-thinking changes.

The attrition experienced in some of our houses, strictly for the health and safety of our guests, offered us badly needed down-time to make critical capital repairs on houses and apartments—some of

which had been in continuous group occupancy for decades. We simply couldn't turn away any man or woman who needed immediate shelter. **Each morning 10-14 were gathered on our doorstep**, which Covid rendered an unsafe situation. This caused a repurposing of our campus thrift store to allow social distancing during the admissions process—and provided a healthy setting for inoculations and house leader meetings and programs, which will be useful far into the future.

We, too, feel restored as we near opening up our restored **Holy Family Apartments**—by the grace of volunteer carpenters and handymen sent to us by churches and organizations (pictured in previous issues). We are proud to offer longer term housing for those who have experienced chronic homelessness.

With City, County and Tax Credit partnerships, we continue to pursue funding for greatly expanded PSH housing to occupy our Caroline lot. As we know, the wheels of government grind slowly. This gives me, especially, the opportunity to practice patience!

At Loaves & Fishes

Meals served to street populations were up 23% in 2021 over 2020, despite the February ice storm causing temporary closure. Even "closed," a few brave volunteers rustled up modest sustenance for those not sheltered in Reliant Stadium. As the pandemic seems to wane, the numbers gathered in our food lines remain higher than pre -pandemic counts, with a daily a*verage* of 345 meals served. We have noticed a marked increase in families joining our line to supplement their meager incomes.
